### September Letter

"Maybe it's not too late. To learn how to love and forget how to hate."

Words not from Jesus nor the Bible but from Ozzy Osbourne, the 'prince of darkness'. Many Christians have condemned this terrible satanic man. The sad problem is not many of those Christians have seen Ozzy live. Yes, the bleep machine would blow up with the language, but most of Ozzy's songs had a positive and life-giving message. I'm not trying to be topical or trendy (as an Ozzy fan I'm guessing being 'trendy' has passed me by). When asked about why Ozzy did what he did the response was, "All I ever wanted to do was to do something good so that my parents could be proud of me."

Think for a moment of our young people who are still digesting their A level, GCSE and vocational exam results. Some young people will be ecstatic, others crushed. Music, any music touches one's soul. At a funeral today, Barrie, our amazing organist played the hymn, 'The day thou gavest Lord is ended...' The tune, the words and even the pauses - all things can be powerful if we have as Jesus said, 'ears to hear.'

Ozzy was a man who punished his body for many reasons. But during his final months and weeks he let people see the real Ozzy, the great love he gave and received from his family and close friends. He died with love surrounding him and he had made many people proud. A lyric that should challenge our churches is, "There are no unsavable souls". I wonder if he saw himself in these words?

Ozzy also was a humble man. Think about the following words, "My son Jack once said to me, 'Dad, do you think people are laughing with you or at you?' And I said, 'I don't care as long as they're laughing." We can be very pompous in our churches and how we deal with new or different things. For years he was called the Anti-Christ and yet every night he said more than once with the greatest

passion, "I love you all, God bless you." I know the power of this as I was lucky to see Ozzy in concert twice. Imagine someone who asked God to bless between 15 – 150,000 thousand men, women and children.

I'm not saying Ozzy was a role model in every aspect of his life, but, neither am I or you. Yet, Jesus Christ can work through Ozzy, and me and you. God in Christ works through the power of the Holy Spirit in our brokenness. So, as we pick up the pace after our summer breaks let's value the gifts of humility, compassion and have the courage to look at our shadows, our brokenness and allow Christ in. Allowing Christ in is the first step to walking the path of a Disciple of Christ; working together with vastly different people all trying to build up the family of God. Whatever your taste in music, and whatever your taste in church and worship – please be open to different things as "God speaks in a thousand places."

God bless you all this September and may God especially bless our young people. Amen.

### And in the News - articles from Parish Pump

The following article may be of interest as background to our focus on SAT-7 in the All Age Community Service on 14<sup>th</sup> September.

The archbishop in Jerusalem recently addressed General Synod.

Here are some highlights of what he said... It is a long article but this is to provide you with as full a picture as possible.

# Gaza food system 'like Hunger Games' - Archbishop Hosam

The leader of the Anglican church in the Holy Land has urged Christians to "speak out in the face of injustices" – including the "horrifying' current arrangements for food aid in Gaza" – as he called for a permanent ceasefire to end the war.

The Most Revd Hosam Naoum, the Archbishop in Jerusalem, was addressing the General Synod in July. He said that at that time, hospitals were being bombed in Gaza, medical supplies were in short supply and that there was a 'horrifying' system of food distribution, comparable to the dystopian series *The Hunger Games*, with three sites open one hour a day for two million people.

Calling for a restoration of humanitarian supplies including food and medicine, under UN supervision, Archbishop Hosam said there should be no targeting of civilians, especially emergency workers and medical staff.

He called for the release of all hostages and captives and a permanent ceasefire for the end of the war and rebuilding of Gaza –

"not ethnic cleansing that is presently being discussed by the Israeli and US Government."

The church is committed to peace building and reconciliation – a message that he has repeated "time and time again" – but these are "alien terms" that people across both sides of the divide refuse to talk about or even listen to, he said.

"I realise that as a church we live and embody the Gospel and we are not politicians.

"However, we need to speak out in the face of injustices and be prophetic for the sake of our people and our calling as Christians.

"But where a church is wounded and constrained, we need the wider body of Christ to help us to be the church in brutal and damaging times."

The Most Reverend Hosam Naoum is the 15th Anglican Bishop in Jerusalem, a role he has held since 2021. He was born in Haifa and grew up in Shefa'amr in Galilee.

The Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem is home to about 7,000 Anglicans worshipping within 28 different congregations. It is also responsible for more than 30 institutions, including hospitals, schools, clinics, and rehabilitation centres. The Diocese is scattered across five separate countries or territories: Jordan, Palestine, Lebanon, Syria, and Israel.

Editor: We regularly support our local hospices and Macmillan Cancer Care. I feel the following article is something we would all agree with and support.

General Synod calls for a funding of palliative care instead of 'unworkable and unsafe' assisted suicide law.

General Synod has called on the Government to improve funding for "desperately needed" palliative care, rather than putting vulnerable people at risk through "unworkable and unsafe" legislation to introduce assisted suicide.

Members of the Synod recently backed a call by the Bishop of London for the Government to increase funding for palliative care and palliative care research to enable people to live their lives in full until they die.

The debate heard speeches opposing a change in the law and backing increased funding for palliative care from a range of different Synod members including clergy who work in hospice care, NHS consultant surgeons, GPs, and a psychiatrist.

Bishop Sarah Mullally, who is a former Chief Nursing Officer for England, said she was "deeply concerned" by the Terminally Ill Adults (End of Life) Bill, which would legalise assisted suicide, being brought by Kim Leadbeater Bill MP.

And she called on General Synod members to pray and to "engage" with peers in the House of Lords as the Bill goes to the House of Lords.

She told the Synod the Bill was "unsafe and unworkable" and would put vulnerable groups at risk, including terminally ill people who cannot access the end-of-life care they need.

"Successive governments have failed to reduce inequalities in health," she said. "These inequalities mean that some people will have up to 20 fewer good years in health than others and certain groups face persistently worse health outcomes than others.

"These inequalities are also pronounced at the end of life, with only one in four people who need end-of-life care being able to access it, and there continues to widespread misunderstanding and distrust of palliative care.

"It is into this context that the Terminally III Adults Bill is being proposed. So, with only a third of all hospice care being funded by the NHS, the proposals are accompanied by a government commitment to fund in full an assisted suicide service should the bill be passed.

"Rather than funding assisted dying, the Government should be funding palliative care and palliative care research to enable people to live their lives to the full until they die."

Bishop Sarah said the Government's own equality impact assessment recognised that some vulnerable people may choose an "assisted" death either because they cannot access the care that they need, or because they may feel pressure to end their lives due to the cost of the care.

# Did you spot many butterflies this past summer?

Editor: My friend Erica Fretwell registered our church 2 years ago with the UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme (UKBMS) as a small site for butterfly surveying. She visits weekly and sends her results to them. We were the first church to register as a small site and UKBMS were really thrilled. One small step to becoming an ECO church.

The wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation is deeply worried about our butterflies. Or rather, the lack of them. It seems that more than

80 per cent of our species have declined sharply in number since 1970s.

Each summer sees the Big Butterfly Count, when the public is encouraged to send in the number of butterflies they have seen over a short period of time. Last year saw the lowest number of butterflies spotted in the count's 14-year history. Even the familiar species like the small white, common blue and small tortoiseshell had their worst summer ever. And a record number of people saw no butterflies at all.

Butterflies have been hit by climate change, the use of pesticides, and damage to their habitats. The drought this summer will have been bad news for their caterpillar offspring, which need growing plants to feed on.

So, this autumn, why not plan a happier year for butterflies in 2026? # Editor: attention all dog owners! Dog walkers warned of deadly risk

It has not been a good summer to let your dog go swimming.

The hot and dry weather this spring sparked a rise in toxic bluegreen algal blooms which have affected lakes and rivers across the UK. Blue-green algal blooms are triggered when colonies of bacteria use warmth and sunlight to reproduce rapidly. The colourful scum they produce can make people very ill and can kill dogs.

The Dogs Trust says: "We're urging all dog owners to avoid letting their dogs swim in or drink from lakes or rivers that look green, scummy, have surface foam, or have warning signs nearby. Bluegreen algae is not always easy to spot, so if in doubt, don't let your dogs swim in or drink from the water."

Blue-green algal blooms often persist for several months and do not disperse until cold weather arrives. The blooms have been found from Norfolk and Essex to Birmingham and the Lake District.

Symptoms of blue-green algae poisoning in dogs can begin within minutes and include vomiting, diarrhoea, drooling, muscle tremors, seizures, breathing difficulties, and collapse.

Affected dogs should be taken to a vet immediately. The condition can be fatal as the toxins attack the liver and neurological system, and there is no antidote. Smaller dogs only need to consume a small quantity to be at high risk of death.

The pet charity Blue Cross warns: "Even small quantities of water or licking contaminated water off the coat can be dangerous."


I know a fair number of people would like to see more community information in the magazine. This is possible but it needs to be provided, sent in a format I can use in the magazine.
